Out of our conversations and interactions with the elders of Waukesha City Church, I have been impressed with their reaction to this building and its history. They love the various plaques around the building, and they intend on keeping those in place. They want to honor First Presbyterian Church of Waukesha and the rich history that we have had (since 1846).

It is like watching a relay race in slow motion. We have the baton and are entering the “passing zone”. They are beginning to run and are holding out their hand to take the baton from us and run their leg. We are “gassed” having given the race our all (for 185 years), they are primed to sprint off ahead. All in the name and power of Jesus the Christ our Savior and friend.

We are entering a watershed moment. In the near future, we will be leaving this beloved building which is filled with so many memories. Such years of wonderful worship. So many good ministries begun which helped so many others. So many good friendships and growth as followers of the living Christ.

There is grief here, but we have all known grief before. The loss of a spouse, the loss of driving privileges, the loss of our home, the loss of a good friend, or a child. We know that grief is part of life, that it shows us how deeply we have loved.

One of the first big moments of grief comes when we have moved through our shock and, for the first time- but not the last- fully feel our loss. Not just accept it, but welcome fully that feeling of loss into our depths, the deep hole that has been unexpectedly dug in our lives that we are unable to fill. Tears happen. It is only when we fully feel this loss that a doorway opens, and we are invited to move through to a different chapter in our life.

God walks with us during this time of grief.  
God honors the depth of our feelings.  
God is preparing us for the next chapter of our life together.

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## Questions and Answers with Pastor Glen

Since Session has declared that we will be exploring selling our building to the Waukesha City Church, some questions have arisen. As Session members, we are always willing to answer any questions that members may have. Here are a few questions that have come up and some answers. I hope they are helpful.

### **1. Who is Waukesha City Church?**

From their website [www.wakeshacitychurch.org](http://www.wakeshacitychurch.org): “Waukesha City Church (WCC) is a growing gospel community consisting of a group of people working together to establish a new church in the city of Waukesha. As a group, we believe that God has called us to start a church to reach out to people who might never have previously given any thought to the claims of Jesus Christ or the idea of ever being part of a church.” WCC is part of the Converge denomination [www.converge.org](http://www.converge.org).

### **2. How did Session find them? Or did they find us?**

With Session’s approval, Pastor Glen called Berg Management to see if they were interested in buying our historic building. The person who answered the phone told him of a church that had recently called to see if any building in downtown Waukesha was for sale. That church was without a building. The person at Berg Management gave this unknown church our contact info. They called. I arranged to meet them with Elder Winkelmann for an initial conversation. The conversations have blossomed from there.

### **3. How many members does Waukesha City Church have?**

About 100 members with another 50 or so regular visitors. They have over 70 youth and children (mostly children) attending church. They have been growing at about 15% per year for the past 5 years.

### **4. What does the Milwaukee Presbytery think of all of this?**

We have had wonderful and wise counsel from the Presbytery of Milwaukee (MP). They helped us find an attorney who crafted the current lease (MP approved it too.) that we have with WCC. They continue to pray for us as we seek to find the downtown Waukesha Church to “join with”.

### **5. When will the building be sold?**

That is a more complicated question. We are Presbyterian after all. We do things “decently and in order”. We need to be in consultation with the Milwaukee Presbytery. Before we sell this building, we will hold a congregational meeting in which all members are entitled to vote to sell. Stay tuned. This is a process of transparency. No closed doors. No smoke-filled rooms. We will keep all members informed as to where we are in the process as best as we are able.

### **6. Might my funeral be held here at the church building even after it is sold?**

That is a solid YES!!!! WCC has promised that any FPCW member who would like their funeral in our beloved church building will be able to do so.


### 7. What will happen to Pastor Glen?

# A New Beginning

The four young men nodded earnestly in the conference room as they listened to the instructions from their landlord. He encouraged them to call if there were any problems, and everyone made sure they exchanged phone numbers. Then the keys were handed over, and a joyous “yeeee” came from one of the men. It was a new beginning to a journey that had brought only trouble so far.

The four were recently recovered from a labor trafficking situation by our ministry partner UMOS, and their case is still under investigation. For their protection and to avoid interfering with the authorities, I can't share many of their details at this point. Their situation, however, follows a painfully familiar pattern. The four were recruited in Central America to come to the United States for agricultural work, with a proper visa. They were promised \$16/hour for a large job in a nearby state. It would be good-paying, temporary work to supplement their household incomes.

Nothing was as promised. They were transported to different states than what their visas allowed, immediately putting them in violation of their work program. They received half of the pay that had been promised, for entirely different work. Under state and federal law, people who are victims of labor trafficking have protections, because it's recognized that the recruiters or employers are the ones violating the law through fraud, force, or coercion. When workers agree to cooperate with authorities on the investigation and prosecution, they remain in the United States until the conclusion of the case and might be able to receive a work permit during that interval. Because cases can drag out for years, the choice to remain here and away from families can be a tough one to make. Not surprisingly, some will choose to return home and to try to forget the trauma of what happened. Others, like these four men, make the courageous decision to stay and participate in our justice system.

With the help of generous Presbyterians who responded to the urgent call for donated items, we moved furniture and household supplies into the new apartment this past weekend. Thank you, Milwaukee Presbytery, for responding so quickly! These young men repeated expressed their thanks to you as well.

The next several months will be difficult while they await continued presence work visas, but UMOS offers continuing support under federal grants and through donations. One man hopes to find work in his field as an industrial electrical engineer. Another wants to complete the remaining two years on his mechanical engineering degree. The others are willing to work in any capacity free from fraud, force, and coercion.

In Matthew 25, Jesus spoke of those who were naked and needed clothing. In that image, we see people who are vulnerable and unable to care for their basic needs. Victims of labor trafficking suffer those same vulnerabilities. At the hands of exploiters, they are unable to care for themselves and their families. As we explore our call under Matthew 25, I encourage you to consider the Presbytery Moderator's invitation to watch a [condensed version of UMOS' webinar](#) on labor trafficking and to let us know if you're willing to be part of a response team, as people are recovered. Thank you for offering a new beginning to exploited workers in our midst.

## Session Recap

The Session has had a busy summer and was able to meet in June, July and August. Most of the time was spent discussing the future of the church, in terms of both the building and the congregation. Time was also spent discussing our Covid policy and what protocols should be in place.

FPCW signed a lease with Waukesha City Church which allows them to use the church for Sunday services and mid-week activities. They are using the former Caring Place space for administrative functions and programming activities. They agreed to a worship time of 10:45 am, which did require us to move our service up to 9:30 am. WCC expressed interest in purchasing the building, but that would not likely happen until 2022.

It continues to be the intent to join with another congregation. There are several potential churches that have been identified. The current plan is to start visiting these churches on Sunday to get a sense how well FPCW would fit. There was excitement as the other churches started to have in-person services, but this may be curtailed, due to the Delta variant.

At the August Session meeting, a decision was made to try to return to a pre-pandemic worship service. This would include hymn singing, passing of the peace and choir music. As of now, there will be a Rally Sunday event on September 12, which includes a Blessing of the Backpacks and a fellowship time after the service. The Delta variant may prevent these activities from occurring.

The Session continues to perform mission work and identify groups in need. FPCW donated to the Joshua Glover Justice Fund and will support Loaves and Fishes this year. We also signed a petition to support the SSO program which provides meals for Waukesha School District students.

Financially, the church is in a good position. We restarted the monthly draws from the Endowment Fund. The building and grounds continue to be well maintained. There are not any major expenses expected. Current number of FPCW members is 70.
